Do Not Be Afraid...

Persecution and relief are some of the thread that runs through this Sunday's readings. In the first reading, the prophet Jeremiah feels the betrayal of friends and their threats against him. At the same time the prophet also experiences the protecting presence of the Lord, like a "mighty hero" (v.11) who sustains those who trust in Him and overcomes all who oppose Him

Psalm 69 combines the plight of those who suffer for the Lord's cause with the experience of the Lord's consolation. "The Lord listens to the needy".

- St. Paul reminds us in the Second Reading, the overflowing gift of grace that we have received from God through Jesus Christ. The gift of God in Christ outweighed the sin and physical death that came from it. This is captured also in the Easter proclamation when the priest sings: 'O Felix culpa'. O Happy fault (of Adam) that gained for us such a Great Redeemer.
- St. Matthew's Gospel presents Our Lord's instructions to the Twelve. He told them not to fear physical persecution, because there is a far greater threat and danger, that of Spiritual death or "the destruction of one's soul". As His followers we are to take courage in times of darkness, for the Heavenly Father is in control. He governs all creation and will take particular care of His children. We are to continue to give courageous public witness to our Christian faith in God.

Due to privacy laws, some hospitals do not provide names of Catholic patients to our Catholic Chaplains.
